# **Message from the Principal**

In 2016 we had much to be proud of at Neutral Bay Public School. The students achieved outstanding success in academic areas and in a wide range of extra curricula activities.

A number of new initiatives were introduced in 2016. These included Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) which at Neutral Bay we titled the *The Bay Way*, additional extra curricula opportunities for the students, parent information sessions on mathematics, NAPLAN, cyber safety and building resilience; Parent Focus Groups and a community information night. I am appreciative of the staff and parent support for these initiatives.

The staff of our school participated in a range of professional learning activities throughout the year, mainly in their own time. Our school committed \$155 000 for this purpose knowing the direct benefit professional learning has for student learning.

In NAPLAN, our Year 3 students performed at a high level in all aspects of literacy and numeracy. An average of 49% of students achieved the highest band, an average of 40% of our Year 5 students achieved the highest band in all aspects. For growth from Year 3 to Year 5, 67% of students exceeded expected growth and 68% of our former students exceeded expected growth from Year 5 to Year 7.

We are extremely appreciative to our parents and community. To our classroom helpers and those who help with canteen, P&C, School Council, committees, scripture, ethics, library, excursions, sport, uniform, concerts, band, classroom learning programs and special days— we value you very much for your assistance and what you added to our school.

To our staff, which includes teachers and administration, I thank you for your dedication to our profession, the commitment you made to the students and the extra work you undertook which added to our school.

I certify that the information in this report is the result of a rigorous school self–evaluation process and is a balanced and genuine account of the school's achievements and areas for development.

#### Message from the school community

#### Neutral Bay Public School Parents and Citizens Association Annual Report 2016

The Neutral Bay Public School P&C Association is pleased to report on its activities for 2016. The NBPS P&C Association fulfills a number of functions in the school community:

- as a forum for parent and school executive interaction and consultation with regular contributions from both the Principal and Deputy Principals;
- · the provision of funding for key educational and other resources, through fundraising activities;
- · operating two businesses which provide key services to the Community (Canteen and Uniform Shop);
- · organising the school bands and the orchestra;
- · organising social and other events for school families and the community;
- representing the views of, and providing information to the school community;
- · representing parents in interactions with our broader local community.

**Funding projects:** The primary objective of the P&C's fund raising activities is to direct funds raised towards enhancing the educational outcomes and experience for all students at the school. Accordingly, in the year to 30 September 2016, the P&C Association contributed \$190,000 to the ongoing support of the Science and Music programs at the school (\$110,000), additional IT resources (\$30,000), and support of learning support programs (\$30,000). This year, the P & C also funded the purchase of a portable stage to enable the school to host all of school assemblies (\$20,000). Voluntary contributions are the backbone of the P&C's fundraising efforts and I would like to thank the very generous support of all Neutral Bay families in 2016. I am pleased to report that we raised \$101,405 from voluntary contributions, representing an 18.7% increase over 2015, with a participation rate of over 60%, up from around 50% in 2015.

**Fundraising and Events:** NBPS enjoyed another year of strong fundraising and events. The highlights for 2016 included the Twilight Picnic, Welcome Drinks, Grandfriends' Day, Mother's and Father's Day and the Federal Election BBQ. These were all great community events, supported by our parent body and our wonderful group of volunteers. Our highlight event for the year was the 'Bay Fair' Carnival, a celebration of the sense of community in our school. Amid glorious sunshine thousands attended the event and we exceeded our fundraising target, raising an impressive \$41,000. The collective effort of the teachers and parent volunteers must also be recognized. It is the efforts of all those involved in the Carnival Committee that delivered beyond expectations and ensured that the Carnival was a great success.

I want to thank the entire P&C Executive team for their tireless efforts during 2016. I wish the newly elected representatives of the P&C in 2017 all the best in their roles. Finally, on behalf of the parents and the entire NBPS School Community, I wish to acknowledge the incredible contribution that the teaching and administrative staff continue to deliver for our children, the students. Accordingly, the P&C extends its gratitude for their amazing professionalism, dedication and support in 2016.

#### **School Council 2016**

The NBPS Council is a formal body compromised of parents, teachers and community representatives, including our local state member. Our objective is to assist the school with the wider issues of the school. Less profile than the P&C. the Council tends to work more closely on matters such school budgets, school physical environment, safety, school curriculum and academic results, plus working with the Department of Education to assist the school to deliver the highest quality education possible. Specifically, we directly assist the School Executive to deliver the School Plan. The major focus of the School Council during 2016 was to develop a future plan for the school. It was developed by working closely with the Principal, Deputy Principal and the Department of Education. The final plan was completed and submitted in October to the Department of Education formally requesting funds to extend the school. The plan includes a building that is likely to be 2/3 stories to maximise use of land, an additional 14 classrooms, room for After School Care, a larger hall, purpose built areas, toilets, library, canteen, staff room, entry and exit plans and a new administration area. The plan, extending to 2041 and accommodating an additional 325 students provides a working platform of the physical school taking into account future demographics and community considerations. The plan has become urgent due to the increasing pressure of student numbers especially over the next five years. The detailed plan was presented to the NSW Minister for Education and the School Education Director. Council is pleased to confirm the request to upgrade our School to meet future demographics has been received and acknowledged by the Department of Education. The School Council will continue to press this issue. Council are very pleased that through the combined efforts of many, and a visit by the then Minister for Transport and Infrastructure, Mr. Andrew Constance, North Sydney Council has agreed and has commenced upgrading the safety on the intersection of Ben Boyd Road and Yeo Street. North Sydney Council and Road and Maritime Services (RMS) have been extremely proactive, with works due for completion early 2017. Other key issues being addressed by Council include teacher parking and future allocation. This will remain a key issue for 2017.

# School background

## **School vision statement**

To develop each child's academic, social, creative, physical, cultural and citizenship ability.

## **School context**

Neutral Bay Public School is situated close to the busy commercial area of Neutral Bay, a lower north shore suburb of Sydney. Established in 1886, the school has a long tradition of academic excellence and is proud of its outstanding reputation for providing quality programs in all curricula, as well as in technology, public speaking, creative arts, band, sport and student leadership. Opportunity classes for academically able students in Years 5 and 6 offer extension and enrichment programs. In a safe and caring environment, all students are encouraged to be active participants in their learning. The school values, develops and maintains strong partnerships with parents and the community. The school is well supported by an active P&C and a committed School Council.

# Self-assessment and school achievement

#### Self-assessment using the School Excellence Framework

This section of the Annual Report outlines the findings from self–assessment using the School Excellence Framework (SEF), school achievements and the next steps to be pursued.

The SEF results were determined from bodies of evidence gathered as part of an external validation process and from the on–going evidence from the impact milestone evaluations detailed in the School Plan.

#### Learning

The results of this process indicated that in the School Excellence Framework domain of Learning, our school is sustaining and growing in the elements of learning culture, assessment and reporting and student performance measures. We are delivering in well being and curriculum and learning.

Our efforts have primarily focused on learning, well being and curriculum. The following strategies have occurred as part of this focus.

- A demonstrated commitment to catering for individual learning needs through practices such as differentiation and individual learning plans.
- Student achievement levels in the aspects of writing, counting sequences, place value and multiplication and division were plotted into the *Planning for Literacy and Numeracy* (PLAN) data base.
- All grades K–6 implemented a writing project which included reflection on best practices, use of rubrics, consistency in teacher judgement practices and setting of student learning goals.
- All staff implementing Focus on Reading comprehension strategies.
- Year 2 staff implementing Teaching Early Numeracy (TEN) strategies.
- All staff implementing NSW syllabuses for Australian Curriculums in History and Geography and scope and sequences designed. (Refer to School Plan)
- · All staff implementing Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) program.
- All staff implementing appropriate learning adjustments and utilising the Learning and Support Team (LaST) to assist targeted students.

## **Teaching**

The results of this process indicated that in the School Excellence Framework domain of Teaching, our school is sustaining and growing in all of the elements which are effective classroom practice, data skills and use, collaborative practice, learning and development and professional standards.

Our efforts have primarily focused on collaborative practice and effective classroom practice. The following strategies have occurred as part of this focus.

 Staff engaged in professional learning on the use and understanding of the Literacy and Numeracy continuums and plotting of data into PLAN.

- All staff engaged in professional learning in the understanding and implementation of Focus on Reading.
- Stage 1 staff engaged in professional learning in the understanding and implementation of TEN.
- · All staff engaged in professional learning in the understanding and implementing of PBL.
- All staff engaged in professional learning for the NSW syllabuses for the Australian Curriculums in History and Geography.
- All staff engaged in the analysis and use of data to determine future learning and teaching.
- All staff involved in collaborative planning days held at the end of each term focusing on developing differentiated units of work in literacy and numeracy.
- All grades K–6 implemented a writing project which was collaboratively planned, grade presentation to staff and involved instructional rounds.
- All staff involved in developing Professional Development Plans (PDP) which were framed on Australian Professional Standards for Teachers.

#### Leading

The results of this process indicated that in the School Excellence Framework domain of Leading, our school is sustaining and growing in management practices and processes. We are delivering in leadership, school planning, implementation and reporting and school resources.

Our efforts have primarily focused on providing leadership to engage the community, support early career teachers, aspiring leaders and professional learning for the staff. Our school has a Leadership Team who meets on a weekly basis to discuss, plan, engage and inspire all of our staff and community. Our parent bodies of Parents' and Citizens' Association and School Council are also part of this process. The following strategies have occurred as part of this focus.

- · Extensive consultation with parents and community.
- Extensive range and involvement in parent educational sessions.
- Development and resourcing of early career teacher skills and understandings.
- · Development and resourcing of aspiring leaders' skills and understandings.
- Engaging staff in a range of relevant professional learning linked with their PDPs and resourcing these activities.
- Developing appropriate procedures for gathering student information such as PLAN and National Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD).
- Providing appropriate resources for recording student information through software such as Sentral.
- Providing appropriate resources such as Learning Support Officers to assist in implementing individual learning plans.
- Providing appropriate resourcing for teaching and learning activities.

Our self–assessment and the external validation process will assist the school to refine the strategic priorities in our School Plan, leading to further improvements in the delivery of education to our students.

## **Purpose**

To aspire for all students at Neutral Bay Public School to be successful, confident and creative learners.

# **Overall summary of progress**

Teachers understand continuums and are using PLAN to plot student progress in identified aspects. This data is enhancing the monitoring and planning for student progress. Key staff have been trained to implement Focus on Reading and TEN across all stages. This is to be continued in 2017. These program have been implemented in response to student data.

All teaching staff trained to implement the Geography syllabus in readiness for 2017. Whole school and grade meetings focussed on the development of skill based scope and sequence charts to provide useful planning documents for the future with literacy clearly embedded into all learning. The school now has practical, detailed documents for each grade which focus on cross curricular perspectives and concepts students will need to succeed in the 21st century.

- Extend training and understanding of TEN program to all Year 1 teachers.
- Plot into PLAN 100% of students in all aspects of numeracy and literacy.
- PLAN data to be analysed and used for reporting and programming.
- Standardised tests to be implemented for benchmarking all students in spelling, numeracy and reading.
- NAPLAN data to be analysed to determine future focus areas for development and improvement.

# **Strategic Direction 2**

Promote Well-being and Citizenship

## **Purpose**

To develop Neutral Bay Public School citizens who live fulfilling, productive and responsible lives.

## Overall summary of progress

Our school implemented Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) in 2016. The implementation was led by a motivated committee. In 2017 our school will be implementing phase 2, which focuses on classroom systems. In association with PBL social skills programs were implemented in all grades.

Professional learning in the National ConsistentCollection of Data (NCCD) was undertaken by all teaching staff and information provided to parents through the school newsletter and P&C meetings. This in association with enhanced Learning and Support Team processes provided enhanced monitoring and planning of student progress. This enabled us to improve early identification and intervention to provide stronger, more focussed support to individual students in partnership with parents.

# **Overall summary of progress**

There has been enhanced opportunities to increase the involvement of parents in the school and in particular the learning of their children. The school–home learning partnerships have enabled parents to help their children to continue learning and practical student skills from school to home.

Communication has been enhanced between school and home leading to high levels of volunteering in many and varied aspects of school life. This includes canteen, uniform shop, band, P&C fundraising activities, school productions and school information sessions. In addition, the School Plan and School Excellence Framework were meticulously prepared and successfully delivered with full consultation of all stakeholders.





# Percentage in bands:











Percentage in BandsSchool Average 2014-2016












Percentage in BandsSchool Average 2014-2016


Percentage in Bands



# **Policy requirements**

#### **Aboriginal education**

Neutral Bay Public School is committed to build all students' understanding and knowledge of Aboriginal histories, cultures and languages. Aboriginal perspectives are incorporated across all new Australian Curriculum syllabuses.

In 2016, the Aboriginal Education Committee undertook a number of projects to enhance understanding and knowledge.

Every student participated in classroom and whole school learning activities in NAIDOC week with a focus on Aboriginal music, histories, culture and languages.

The Aboriginal Education Committee has furthered its partnership with Moree Public School as a 'sister' school. Two staff members have visited the school and several classes have been involved in communication with other classes at Moree Public School.

#### Multicultural and anti-racism education

Neutral Bay Public School is comprised of many cultures. 40% of our students are from Non–English Speaking Backgrounds (NESB). The procedures place a strong emphasis on inclusiveness and tolerance. These values are specifically taught in all classrooms as part of the Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) program.

#### Other school programs

#### **Band 2016**

2016 has seen all bands make great progress. Junior Band had 70 members and won a Gold Medal at the NSW Band Festival. Senior Band had 40 members and won a Silver Medal at the NSW Band Festival and also performed at the Sydney Eisteddfod. Concert Band had 36 members and won a Silver Medal at the NSW Band Festival. Concert Band also performed at the Sydney Eisteddfod and the Primary Proms Concert at Sydney Town Hall. Band Camp and the Band Workshop were both highly successful events with the students having fun and improving their skills as a group. All bands performed at end of year assemblies. Our end of year Concert was held at Norths Leagues Club where all bands performed including Reunion Band. 2017 looks set to be a great year for the Band Program with 99 students trying out for Junior Band. This year a new band co-ordination model was trialed with the role spread across a number of people with Mr Tan performing the role of overseer. This model proved to be very successful.

## **Schools Spectacular**
